
### **Background Could Be Better**

Conductor Lit from Below


## Not Enough Lens to Get Closer

### Look Around

Sometimes, when you're walking around waiting for inspiration, hoping to find something that will turn you on, you ought to look up or, in this case, down. You may find some surprises.

Try not to always shoot straight ahead.

Also, try not to always shoot from or at the height of your eyeballs.

"Where" is a very important consideration. It should not default to the easiest way possible. Explore all the possibilities: high, low, with the light, against the light. Don't be too accepting until you check out all the possibilities.
